
Happy Valentines Day everyone and welcome to February!

UPCOMING PROGRAMS AND WORKSHOPS:

Rootstock Orders

If you ordered Apple and Pear rootstock, those should be delivered sometime towards the end of February. All that Perry County was allotted have been spoken for. However, there may be a few extras so if you need some, call our office and get on a waiting list for any extras.

Plant Orders

We are still taking orders for plants until March 15, 2024. The plants we have available are two varieties of Strawberries, Blackberries, two varieties of Blueberries, Raspberries & Black Raspberries, Asparagus, and Candy onions. I have placed an order form on the Perry County Extension webpage under the Ag & Natural Resource link. You can also call our office to place your order.

Mini-Beekeeping School

Preparing for the 2024 Growing Season

The arrival of February means Spring is just around the corner, which means it's time to gear up for this year's growing season. Even though it's still chilly outside, there are some outdoor chores that need doing this month.



First, February is the best time to fertilize your fruit plantings. Fertilize cherry, pear, apple, peach, plum, blackberry, raspberry, and blueberries this month. Cherry, peach, and plum trees need 1/6 pound of a 30% nitrogen fertilizer per tree per year of age. Pear trees need 1/8 pound of a 30% nitrogen fertilizer per tree per year of age. Apple trees need ½ pound of a 30% nitrogen fertilizer per tree per year of age. It is best to apply the nitrogen fertilizer by spreading it around the drip line of the tree. The drip line of the tree is the area underneath the canopy of the tree. Do not exceed 3 pounds of nitrogen per tree per season regardless of age.

Blackberries and raspberries need 2 to 4 pounds of a 30% nitrogen fertilizer per 100 feet of row. Blueberries need fertilized at bloom and six weeks after bloom. Use 1 tenth pound of ammonium sulfate fertilizer per plant at each time. Ammonium sulfate helps to maintain an acid PH which blueberries need. For a complete list of fertilizers requirements for home fruit plantings, contact the Perry County Extension Office and ask for publication HO-43.

If you haven't applied a complete fertilizer to your plantings in a while, it may be a good idea to have your soil tested this season. The Perry County Cooperative Extension Service will be offering free soil testing during the entire month of March. I will discuss soil testing further in the March Newsletter.

February is an excellent time to apply miscible oil (dormant oil) to deciduous trees and shrubs. This oil will kill over wintering mites, aphids, and scale. Spray the oil when temperatures are above 40 degrees Fahrenheit, but not within 24 hours of a freeze. Because the oil kills insects by suffocation, avoid spraying on windy days to ensure that all surfaces of the plant are covered.

Some pruning can be done in February. Grapes especially need to be pruned in February to avoid late season bleeding. For most fruit trees, it is best to wait as late as possible and before dormancy break to prune.

You may have already begun receiving garden catalogues. These catalogues offer many choices and contain a wealth of information about varieties that will help prevent diseases caused by fungi, bacteria, viruses and nematodes. Most catalogues will state what to expect in disease resistance for each variety. Letters are often used as abbreviations in fine print. An example is tomato disease resistance where F is for Fusarium wilt, V for Verticillium wilt and N for root knot nematode. Using disease-resistant plants is the safest and most reliable way to control garden disease. It doesn't matter if the pathogen population is abundant, or conditions are ripe for disease development, because resistant varieties provide strong biological protection from disease. For a complete list of recommended garden varieties and garden information, contact the Perry County Cooperative Extension Service and ask for publication ID-128, Home Vegetable Gardening in Kentucky and ID-133, Vegetable Cultivars for Kentucky Gardens.





February through mid-April is the second-best time to seed or reseed your lawn. If you don't plan on tilling the soil before seeding, which is the best method to get a good seed to soil contact, it may be best to seed in February. We call this method Frost Seeding. You seed while the ground is still frozen, and the freezing and thawing helps to move the seed to the ground. Or you can seed ahead of a snow and let the melting snow carry the seed to the ground. You can also get the same results seeding on top of a snow but the birds like this method to and some of your seed may be consumed. Be sure to use recommended Kentucky turf varieties. You can contact the Perry County Extension Office for a complete list.

Everything Tuna Melts



- 3 cans (5 ounces each) tuna in water, drained
- 1 stalk celery, diced
- 1/2 small onion, diced
- 3 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 5 whole-wheat mini bagels, cut in half
- 1 large or 2 small apples, cored and sliced thinly
- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- · 2 teaspoons everything bagel seasoning
- Preheat the oven broiler on low.
- 2. Wash hands with warm water and soap, scrubbing at least 20 seconds.
- 3. Wash fresh produce under cool running water, using a vegetable brush to scrub veggies with a firm surface. Dry and cut to prepare for this recipe.
- In a bowl, combine the tuna, celery, onion, and mayonnaise; mix well.
- On a baking sheet, toast each side of the bagels under the broiler.
- 6. Divide and spread the tuna mixture on each of 10 bagel halves. Top with

apple slices and cheese. Sprinkle with everything bagel seasoning.

- 7. Return the pan under the broiler for 3 to 5 minutes or until the cheese is melted. Serve immediately.
- 8. Refrigerate leftovers within 2 hours.

Note: This recipe is very adaptable. If you do not have whole-wheat bagels, you can substitute with English muffins, hamburger buns, or whole-wheat bread. Try everything flavored bagels and skip the seasoning. Substitute canned chicken for tuna. Use tomato slices or pineapple slices instead of apples to add variety. You can usually find affordable everything bagel seasoning at dollar stores. If you cannot find everything bagel seasoning, try your favorite salt-free herb blend instead.



WHEN AND WHERE TO GET MEDICAL CARE




he types of medical providers has changed rapidly over the past several years. From company name changes and insurance coverage shifts to pop-up clinics and telemedicine, it can be confusing to know which type of provider best suits your needs.

For serious emergencies, always call 911. For example, if you or a person in your care has any of the following:

- · isn't breathing or is turning blue,
- is unconscious,
- · is having a seizure,
- · has a serious allergic reaction,
- has a broken bone that sticks out through the skin,
- · took an unknown amount of medicine, or
- · has a large cut that won't stop bleeding.

Other serious situations need medical attention but may allow for you to transport yourself or someone in your care to an emergency room (ER) or hospital emergency department (ED). Go to an ER if you or someone in your care:

- · has trouble breathing,
- · has a stiff neck and a fever,
- is experiencing a continuous fast heartbeat,
- ingested a poison, drug, or unknown substance,
- · has a head injury and is vomiting,
- · has an eye injury, or
- has a serious burn.

Call your primary-care provider's office with any health-related questions or nonurgent health concerns. They can help you decide what steps to take and how. Call for problems such as a fever, ear pain, a sore throat, belly pain, vomiting or diarrhea, a headache that doesn't go away, possible dehydration, rash, wheezing, or a lasting cough. Calling your regular provider for these kinds of concerns supports "continuity of care" (always seeing a provider who knows you).

If you cannot get to your provider's office or it is after hours and the office is not open, you can go to an urgent care center. Urgent care centers can manage the same problems as your regular health-care provider. These centers also can provide services like X-rays, stitches, and splints.

Telehealth, or telemedicine, are virtual "visits" to a health provider using your phone or

computer through an app or website. You can talk to a provider face-to-face — and the provider can see you on the screen. Your regular health-care provider or health system may provide telemedicine services, and some health insurances offer telemedicine providers. You may want to consider a telemedicine appoint for problems such as:

- · rachos
- · minor cuts or burns
- pink eye (conjunctivitis)
- colds
- fever
- mild allergic reactions
- · vomiting
- diarrhea

If you receive care in an ER, at an urgent care center, or through a telemedicine visit, follow up with your primary-care provider afterward. That way, your provider has the most up-to-date information about your condition and can continue any needed follow-up care.

THIS MONTH'S TOPIC: BULKING UP A THIN CREDIT FILE

Your credit score is used when you apply for new credit, but also it could be used to check your reliability for insurance, rent, or a new job. However, some people have not yet had enough credit to generate a file. FICO, the largest company that provides software for calculating credit scores, estimates that 53 million people in the U.S. do not have enough data in their credit files to generate a FICO Score.

A credit score tells businesses how likely you are to pay back what you owe in a timely way. Your score is based on the information in your credit report, such as payment history, length of time you've had accounts open, and how often you open new accounts. Those who don't yet have a file are sometimes called "credit invisible." Others may have a file, but their past credit practices may have led to a score that is not as high as they might wish.

The good news is, there are a few tools available to those who wish to bulk up a thin credit file, either to create a score or to improve the score they already have. Two of these tools are called Experian Boost and UltraFICO.

ULTRAFICO

UltraFICO is a free service that uses additional information that you agree to share to generate this special score. Using a secure online portal, you link your banking accounts, such as checking or savings, so that your banking activity can be weighed in with your credit report data. This score does not replace your traditional score or become part of your credit report. You use an opt-in feature to share it with lenders. This score may be helpful if you have consistently kept positive balances averaging at least \$400 in your bank account.

EXPERIAN BOOST

Experian is one of the three credit reporting bureaus, and it offers its own free service

called Experian Boost. Boost considers monthly bills you pay that are not normally included in your credit report. You connect the bank account you use to pay your bills and select the bills you want to have counted in your Experian credit file. The system will look through two years of payment history for qualifying bills with recent on-time payments. The following types of bills and payments could qualify: phone, rent, utilities, television, insurance, internet, and video streaming services.

VANTAGESCORE

VantageScore is an additional scoring model that lenders and businesses might use. Its scoring model can generate a score as soon as one month after a credit account is opened, which is faster than FICO's 6-month or more model. Most of the time there is no way to know in advance whether a lender will use Vantage or FICO scores. However, if credit is denied, the lender will disclose the score and the factors that led to the outcome.

A NOTE OF CAUTION

Be aware that once you grant access to the additional information counting toward your score, you must be willing to accept the consequences. Just as paying on time and keeping credit charges low will help, the opposite can hurt your score. If you grant access to either your bill payment history or your bank accounts, you will need to ensure that you make those payments on time, that you maintain a balance, and don't overdraw your account in order for it to reflect positively on your score.

These programs may help pad your file, but they aren't a "cure-all." Remember, the best way to build and maintain a good credit score is to pay bills on time, pay down balances, and avoid new debt.


In-School Programs



Essential Skills for Speech Contest Success

There are several categories for youth to enter as they begin this process at the county level such as speech, demonstration or mock job interview contests.





To perform their best, young orators must be equipped with specific skills to ensure their success. These contests are not just about speaking well; they are about captivating an audience, conveying a message effectively and showcasing confidence and clarity.

1. Understanding the Audience:

Youth must understand their audience. Different audiences have varied interests, levels of understanding and expectations. Speakers should learn to tailor their speech to resonate with their listeners, whether it's a panel of judges or a crowd of their peers.

5. Overcoming Stage Fright:


Building confidence is essential. This includes strategies to overcome nervousness, such as deep breathing exercises, practice and positive visualization.
